# Planning for CSCA 2020: An Update for Everyone

While in Chicago in early June for a visit to next year's conference site, I was remembering that the first time I heard about the Central States Communication Association was from Dr. Jim Golden, then chair of the Communication Department at the Ohio State University. He was teaching a course on Western Rhetoric from a set of notecards that had provided much of the content for *The Rhetoric of Western Thought*, which had just been published.

He talked about going to Chicago for conferences a lot. Decades later, we will be meeting in this storied city with new topics and new concerns but with the same invitational fervor for CSCA that Professor Golden shared with wide-eyed graduate students back in the early 1980s.

Okay, enough with the diachronics. It was at the planner's meeting for the 2020 conference that the scale of the task finally hit me. The room was full of scholars who comprised the leadership team responsible for staging the 2020 conference at the Loews Chicago O'Hare Hotel. I feel very fortunate to be working with such a dedicated and thoughtful team. I attended the CSCA conference in Omaha in 2003 and I never dreamed that I would someday be planning the next meeting!

The theme for the 2020 conference is "Borders and Breakthroughs." My work is located at the intersection of rhetorical criticism and critical intercultural communication. I have always been drawn to the complexity of transitional—or liminal—spaces. Borders are liminal spaces. I have traveled many times to the U.S.-Mexico border, and I have also spent time at the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) that separates South and North Korea. Ohio has an international border that many residents do not realize—the U.S.-Canada border runs through the middle of Lake Erie. I have been fascinated by the articulations of (non)belonging and (non)legitimacy that borders discursively invoke.

And yet, borders are not absolute. What might seem like a logical divide suddenly can be called into question. In the early 1990s, critical scholars argued that their work should be counted as research in intercultural communication (IC). Prior to this, there was a border between post-positivist theory-building and the critique of power enacted across cultures. The latter was not considered IC research. Eventually, the border was transcended, and a breakthrough occurred that allowed multiple research approaches to count as IC research.

***Borders are paradoxical in that they divide but they also identify where things meet.***

As an association of learners, practitioners, instructors, and researchers, we benefit from a periodic examination of the things that separate us from them and this from that.

The recent discussion on CRTNET about the formation of a “Cosmic Communication Division” is exactly about disciplinary borders. The 2020 calls for paper and panel proposals from the CSCA units encourage this reflection. What borders should we question? What borders should we reaffirm? What breakthroughs should we celebrate? These questions outline the thematic core of the next conference.

Having just been at the Loews Chicago O’Hare, I can assert that we have an excellent venue for our next conference, and you don’t want to miss that! More on the program and the venue later. Enjoy the summer and remember that the submission deadline is at the end of the day on October 11.



# CSCA Remembers

## **Irwin Mallin**

Irwin Mallin, 56, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, passed away on Monday, May 6th, 2019 laughter after a 3-year battle with cancer. Irwin's last Central States was Milwaukee in 2018.

Irwin proudly worked for IPFW, now Purdue University Fort Wayne, for nearly 20 years. Hundreds of faculty members, thousands of students, and an untold number of community members have become and remain beneficiaries of Irwin's commitment to highly effective teaching and advising.

Irwin was regularly recognized through campus awards as well as regional and national disciplinary awards for effective teaching and Academic Advising. Most notably, Irwin was named Featured Faculty for Service Excellence in Spring 2019; an award that recognized Irwin's significant contributions to revising the advising practices of PFW faculty.

Irwin chose the life of the academy every day; Purdue Fort Wayne became part of his soul—the students, the faculty, the campus. His life was richly filled with students, mentees, faculty, and friends. His career is admirable and the rich legacy he leaves behind will benefit his students and colleagues for generations. Irwin reminded us at the close of most conversations to “Keep hope alive” and to “Be well.”

## **George Ziegelmueller (As seen on Crtnet)**

We are very sad to report that distinguished professor of Communication and internationally recognized debate educator, George William Ziegelmueller, passed away on May 18 in Chicago. George was a professor of communication and debate coach from 1957 – 2006 where he led WayneState debaters to hundreds of championships in the college debate circuit. Under his direction, Wayne State was established as one of the most successful program in the nation.

George Ziegelmueller was born on July 28, 1930 in Speedway City, Indiana and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from DePauw University in 1952. He earned his Master of Arts degree from Southern Illinois University in 1954, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Speech from Northwestern University in 1958.

He was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church, Royal Oak, Michigan; a member of the American Forensic Association (President and journal editor 1973-1978 and recipient of the Distinguished Member Award 1981); a member of the Speech Communication Association, Central States Communication Association (journal editor 1986-1988), Michigan Association of Speech Communication (President, Honorary life member), and Delta Sigma Rho-Tau Kappa Alpha (President, Distinguished Alumni Award recipient 1974).

He was the recipient of the Alumni Service award from Wayne State University in 1983. He was named the 2000 Michigan Professor of the Year by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education. His book *Argumentation: Inquiry and Advocacy* was considered the standard in the field.

During the 1999 National Debate Tournament, the George Ziegelmueller Award was created to recognize Professor Ziegelmueller for his over 30 years of excellent coaching, timeless commitment to the activity, and numerous contributions to the forensics community. The George Ziegelmueller Award is presented annually at the National Debate Tournament to a faculty member who has distinguished himself or herself in the communication profession while coaching teams to competitive success.

Professor Ziegelmueller was known for his deep commitment to his students, often providing personal support, and sometimes even paying their bills. Alumni fondly remember, and often cite, the “Five D’s” that George used to define the culture of his program and the expectations he had for his debaters:

(No) Drugs and Alcohol - competitors are forbidden from consuming alcohol or illegal substances while at competition.

Dress - students are expected to dress in a professional manner.

Deodorant - Teams travel long distances in small vehicles. Participants were expected to practice appropriate hygiene

Delivery - Students were encouraged to persuade and move their audiences with both the better argument and the best performance.

Decorum - Students were expected to act as ambassadors of the university and the program.

“It’s hard to overstate the impact George had on the debate community and on Wayne State.” said Matthew Seeger, Dean of the College of Fine, Performing and Communication Arts, and former chair of the Department of Communication. “Generations of Wayne State students learned about the power of critical thinking, reasoned discourse, and principled argument from George. He was a supportive colleague and mentor, and an engaged and committed teacher who helped every student he touched. For 45 years, he was the face of Wayne State debate.”

Arrangements for a celebration of his life are being planned for June 28 on the campus of Wayne State.
