- VII. The Women's Caucus continued the fund-raising tradition with donations to Sarah's Circle, a Chicago-based non-profit dedicated to assisting women facing homelessness.
- VIII. shared the "Inspire" theme for the 2021 conference via the Women's Caucus Facebook page and solicited ideas for panels and papers.
  - a. Ideas included:
    - i. Women's physical, emotional, intellectual and/or professional labor related to Covid-19. The pandemic disproportionately impacted women, revealing gender inequity in a variety of contexts.
    - ii. The pressure to be productive during social distancing (e.g. fitness, selfimprovement, etc.)
    - iii. The gendered nature of academic service and the pressure women face to engage in this type of work as well as pressure to support students emotionally. Covid-19 has also revealed gender inequities in academic publishing.
    - iv. Organizing and lifestyle guru, Marie Kondo's Netfix series reveals the gendered in perceptions of household duties and responsibilities. Kondo also has a new book about organizing your professional space and life (e.g. learning to say no).
