  - (a) Lance great idea but it is embarrassing in where no one shows up so maybe have it as a networking event between scholars and practitioners. Sydney talk to organizers to make sure the panel gets the attention it needs. Get a sponsor for refreshments. Finding out things as scholars we might not know. Cimarron think about overlapping with another health conference.
- (8) Open discussion think about how conferences are overlapping, pros of CSCA affordability, cons of CSCA how it is marketed (use planned posts on social media), possibly have a grad student intern that will handle marketing for the division
- (9) Brooke short course how to budget for interdisciplinary colleagues and how to get them to conferences
  - (a) Grant writing short course for health com scholars (what to include in the grant)
- (10) Lance having a fellowship potentially to use as an award or to invite in experts, Comfort Joy Goldsmith and Eileen Wittenberg to talk about care givers and grant writing
- (11) Lance talk about underserved populations and scholars we could support within our field. Maybe a field trip to do create connections, grand rounds at a hospital.

- 2. Create bylaw about grad student intern and passing down organizational history. Especially finances. Add to bylaws about funding.
  - a) 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment Motion Rikki Roscoe, second Elizabeth Hintz adding a social media coordinator, 2 year term (one year present and second year as a mentor, current and past coordinator). Appointed instead of elected. Open to master's students. Change language in bylaws from web coordinator and explicate it in the bylaws.
  - b) 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment adding organizational history about finances and funding, make sure notes get from one leadership group to the next. Public box folder that is shared between leaderships. Article 9 in the bylaws will be adding point C to have finances discussed in meeting notes and to identify funding sources in the bylaws, use language that new sources can be added without a new amendment. Chair will be responsible for finances. Senior members would be willing to help provide start up funds. Chair can appoint committees, have a finance committee appointed to see if a fund needs to be created, named, and managed. Lance is willing to lead the committee, Deb Ford, Donna Poulouskey, Kayia O'Wright possible committee members. Possible person to name award after is Terry. Copy NCA language about awards.
